



'You are the salt of the earth... you are the light of the world' (Mt 5:11-16 – NIV)

There is a school of thought that says that the church should stay out of politics. But as we approach an election Archbishop Tutu's words challenge us "When people say that the Bible and politics don't mix, I ask them which Bible they are reading."

Because of course the Bible is very political; it is trying to influence the way in which a country is governed, which is part of the definition of 'politics' according to the Cambridge Dictionary.

From the law of the Old Testament, through the prophets, to the leaders of the early church, unjust or corrupt practices are spoken against, the behaviour of rulers and those in authority is criticised and a better way is demonstrated. Jesus himself



was executed because of the challenge that he posed to the leaders of his society.

Jesus spoke of his followers being 'salt' and 'light' to the world, to give a Godly flavour to our surroundings and to throw light on what has been hidden in the darkness. Accordingly we are called to engage with the world around us and the issues of the current day, and it is important that we cast our votes in the General Election on Thursday, 8 June, and to vote for those who in our opinion most clearly embody the politics, priorities and values of the gospel and the Kingdom of God.

While on holiday recently I came across what I think of as a relevant poem for our time, even though written many years ago by English poet John Donne (1572-1631):

"No man is an island, Entire of itself. Every man is a piece of the continent, A part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less. As well as if a promontory were. As well as if a manor of thy friend's Or of thine own were: Any man's death diminishes me, Because I am involved in mankind. And therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; It tolls for thee."

I could not help but think that this 17th century poet was more attuned to the world than our nation is today. Are we that "clod" that is about to be washed offshore? Are we still aware that every killing and death in all parts of the world diminishes each of us? Do we still feel involved in the whole of humanity? Do we still welcome the stranger? Or are our thoughts, our focus, our actions more and more concentrated on our own narrow concerns, our own limited horizons?

The General Election, might tell us which way our nation is going, although our first past the post system rarely reflects the views of much more than one third of the population.

As with all elections our church leaders are urging us to pray for all who stand for election and all who will govern us in the future — that is the least we can do.

This issue of Trumpeter, after all that I have said in this column, is very much concentrated on "domestic" issues. A report from the Annual Church Meeting held in April, the Outreach Appeal to keep many of our activities viable for the future, and significant anniversaries of some of our more senior citizens are all featured.

There is a short report reminding us of events away from our shores and it is good that our future king should be the one to express concern about the "evil" of religous persecution pervading our world.

I was surprised to see on BBC news of Henderson Island and its beautiful beach littered with plastic waste, not dropped by people, the island is uninhabited, but which has been washed up by ocean currents. Plastic is reaching every corner of our planet, from uninhabited Pacific islands to coastal communities across the UK, and even in Arctic sea ice. It will take centuries to degrade.

Plastic waste will continue to grow, littering beaches and polluting seas. It is killing sea life and destroying ecosystems and permeating the food chain. It has been found in the seafood on our plates.

Every living thing in our oceans is in danger and slowly being poisoned by plastic. It is ruining coastlines and destroying habitats.

Corporations profit from plastic packaging and don't count the cost to marine life. Businesses must accept responsibility for the true cost of their products and reduce the amount of plastic they use and switch to packaging that can be reused, recycled and composted.

We are encouraged to drink out of throwaway plastic bottles. Most of these are not recycled and end up in our waterways, seas, and landfills. One solution is a deposit return scheme (DRS) — perhaps 10p added to the purchase cost and refunded on return of the empty to collection points. DRS schemes are found in Europe, the USA, Canada, Israel, Fiji, and Austrialia. According to a report from Greenpeace collection rates are as high as 98.5 per cent.

Marine creatures are being choked, seabirds are starving to death. At least 170 species have swallowed plastic in mistake for food. The UN has called the situation a "Toxic time bomb".

Last year we called on politicians to ban microbeads in cosmetics, toothpaste, and cleaning products. They listened and have promised to ban them in most products. We depend on healthy oceans for the air we breath and for food.

Trinity Annual Church Meeting 2 April, 2017

The following is a summary of the main points from the Annual Church Meeting on 2 April, 2017:

- * Anne Gray & Sue Stokes were re-appointed (Sue retiring in August 2017) as Stewards. Alison Arnold, Ann Guy, Catherine Roots and Tasha Williams were appointed as Stewards.. Thanks were expressed to Marina Mele, Donald Wary and Sheila Pollard for their service as Stewards.
- * The existing representatives to the Church Council were re-appointed. Sue Stokes (from August 2017), Marina Mele, Sheila Pollard, Judy Whyman-Bates and Donald Wray were appointed as new Church representatives to the Church Council.
- * Brief reports from many church groups had been displayed in the Anteroom for the whole church to review.
- * The minister reported that, over the last year Helen Wray had been confirmed, four members had moved away and/or resigned their membership, two people had transferred their membership to Trinity. Sadly, five of our congregation have passed away. Prayers were offered for their families. A Remembrance Service will be held on 16 July. This service was introduced in 2012 and has been particularly beneficial for the families of the bereaved. Patience Owers & Sue Horsefield have agreed to become Pastoral Co-ordinators to develop the recommendations of the Pastoral Care Review. Nigel then drew attention to some of the highlights of the past seven years: eight Preaching Series; work with Girls' Brigade & Scouts preparing Parade Services; Weekend Away in March 2016; three year Vision Plan & Trinity Towards Tomorrow; employment of leader for Trinity Toddlers (Alison Arnold then Karen Purton), co-ordinator for Messy Church (Alison Arnold then Tasha Williams), TTT/Church Administrator (Debbie Melvin then Tasha Williams); XTT for 7-11 year olds (ran for two years); Freedom Generation for teenagers; formation of additional housegroups; Alpha courses twice a year for three years; stall at May Fair for last five/six years; Drop-in service providing meal for homeless on Wednesday evenings; formation of Sewing Circle; Picnics in the



Park; Nativity Festival; Church website; information packs. Nigel thanked everyone for their support and wished the church well as we start to make plans to work with Rev Seung-wook Jung from September.

- * Peter Baker summarised the work of the Worship Consultation Group. He drew attention to the Holy Week reflective services, Easter services and the Church Anniversary on 9 July, when Rev Dr David Chapman (District Chairman) will conduct the 10:30 service.
- * Roger Owers had provided a summary of the financial position and Sheila Pollard spoke in his absence. The Annual Report for year ended 31 August 2016 shows a deficit of £3,500 which had been predicted and budgeted for. There is, however, a deficit of £17,000 predicted for next year, caused by there no longer being any residue from the TTT funds which covered the cost of employees' salaries this year. It was agreed to hold a Gift Day on 6 May 2017 to raise money to continue our outreach work and the employment of Toddlers' & Messy Church leaders.
- * Tim Hitchcock outlined work on the property that has been carried out recently, with a list of suggestions for future work. However, no further large amounts will be spent until the results of the Quinquennial Survey, due on 3 May, are known.
- * Dates of next Church Councils: Wednesday, 14 June 2017; Thursday, 2 November 2017.
- * Date of next Annual Church Meeting: Sunday, 29 April, 2018.

A warning from Prince Charles

The growing threat of religious persecution has been branded "evil" by the Prince of Wales who has compared the dangers facing minority faith groups across the world with the "dark days of the 1930s".

In a video for the religious freedom charity "Aid to the Church in Need", Prince Charles said the scale of the problem is under-estimated and not simply limited to Christians in the Middle East, claiming research shows other groups including Jews and Yazidis are also being targeted. He said: "We are now seeing the rise of many populist groups across the world that are increasingly aggressive towards those who adhere to a minority faith. All of this has deeply disturbing echoes of the dark days of the 1930s."

He went on to say it was "beyond all belief" to him that "such evil persecution" still exists, more than 70 years after the Second World War. He added, "I was born in 1948, just after the end of World War Two, in which my parents' generation had fought and died in a battle against intolerance, monstrous extremism and an inhuman attempt to exterminate the Jewish population of Europe."

He also described a recent meeting with a Jesuit priest from Syria who feared there may not be a single Christian left in Iraq within five years.

What's happening to Songs of Praise?

Senior church people have raised concern over the consequences of the BBC losing the right to make Songs of Praise. It has been announced that the much-loved programme is to be produced by independent companies for the next three years. One bishop said, "It's a worry to some of us that it will be another nail in the coffin of our religious literacy as a nation." Another said, "An independent company may well bring a fresh approach to Songs of Praise, but the BBC should also continue to bolster its religious output. At a time when the need for religious literacy and understanding is more acute than ever, the expertise of the BBC's religious department is an asset that needs protecting." The change comes after a new charter agreement with the Government meant existing BBC Studios network TV output must be put out to competitive tender.

Outreach Appeal

Approaching £14,000 says Treasurer

Some people find that it is best for them to give a regular amount each month either in an envelope marked "Outreach Fund" or by standing order. If you are a tax payer, gift aid provides us with an extra 25% on your gift. Please contact Roger Owers, the church treasurer, who will be pleased to help you.

Answer to David Dawes math question on page 7.

The first digit must be a seven since we need 700. The second could be 2 or 3 but not 4 since we need to add at least 7 to the house number. If the second digit was 2 and the third given the letter c then 72c+7+2+c would equal 742. That is the last digit would not be a whole number. Therefore 73c+7+3+c = 742 and c=1. Answer: house number is 731.
