

Finally, may I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a more peaceful and productive New Year.



Trinity Church Council

The following is a summary of the main points from Church Council on 2 November:

- * Jan Cornfoot was appointed as the new Baptism Secretary and Terry Sissons was welcomed as the new Circuit Representative.
- * The Worship Planning Meeting has decided to suspend Food for Thought (F4T) until 29 April 2018, when a new format will be introduced. It was decided to continue with 6pm Sunday services.
- * Sue Horsefield and Patience Owers are continuing to implement the new system, which now includes those who attend Early Church.
- * The Leadership Team is pleased that donations from two sources have enabled us to purchase a defibrillator and cover the cost of training in its use. It was agreed that evening services be held in the Anteroom, particularly in the winter. There is still a great need for more Door Stewards and Communion Stewards. It was agreed that the Leadership Team goes ahead with work to achieve the Bronze Award of EcoChurch and pursue recognition for the Silver Award. Feedback on the monthly Prayer Diary would be appreciated, as it has now been running for a year.
- * Plans for Christmas were listed. Further details will be circulated.
- * The Property Committee has drawn up a five-year plan to complete the requirements of the Quinquennial Report. A Fire Risk Assessment has been carried out and actions recommended have been implemented or planned for. The re-roofing of the Anteroom and corridor has been completed. The Buggy Park is finished and well-used. Lighting in the Main Hall has been improved.
- * Charles Horsefield reported that Aldi has just started offering surplus food for distribution to the needy through FareShare. The service will be in need of helpers to distribute it.
- Roger Owers had prepared a report of the present financial position. The end of year accounts show that the General Fund income was £12,000 less than expenditure. The reasons for this are: expenditure close to budget; cash and envelope giving slightly increased but Standing Orders dropped by £4,000; lower than expected income for room rentals (which is now less than half it was a few years ago), which resulted in income being £10,000 less than budget. The general fund balance of £14,000 is below the lower reserves limit of £22,000 and we will need to recover £8,000 this year. The church has received a bequest of £10,000 from the estate of Anne Pape. It was agreed that it should be used in accordance with her interests outreach, eco-matters and worship. Alison Stokes has been awarded a seven-month contract as Administrator, to cover the Maternity Leave of Tasha Williams.

David Attenborough's Blue Planet 1 was aired 16 years ago. There is incredible life, colour and strange species in our oceans which "are the richest, most diverse, most beautiful, most exciting, and the least known of all earth's eco systems" he said then.

Now, marine life is suffering from over-fishing, global warming, bleaching coral reefs, and threatening cold water species. Acid seas is a by-product of burning fossil fuels. Ocean acidification occurs quickly and marine organisms that need shells are hindered in making them.

By the end of the century cod in the Baltic seas could be much smaller because of the effects of CO2 in the atmosphere being dissolved in seawater to produce weak carbonic acid.

Since that first series David Attenborough has seen how the oceans are changing. Blue Planet 11 currently airing took four years to make. The team visited every

continent and ocean.

An estimated 12 tonnes of plastic enters the ocean every year, with residues found in fish, seabirds and mammals. Discarded plastic is found in the mouths of seabirds and woven into nests. An albatross was seen feeding its young on plastic rather than sand eels, squid and fish. Plastic has even been found in creatures living seven miles deep in the sea.

Mike Barrett of the WWF said: "There is no greater havoc in the natural world".

The UK is to ban micro-beads in cosmetics and personal care products by July 2018. A group of nursery schools has banned using glitter — a micro-plastic — in their crafts and decorations and use lentils instead.

Asda's former boss is calling for supermarkets to stop using plastic packaging. Millions of pounds invested in recycling has failed. The solution is for retailers to reject plastic and use paper, steel, glass or aluminium. Plastic encases fruit, vegetables, meat and dairy products. This reaches landfill and sooner or later the bottom of the oceans.

A radical approach is needed in the use of alternatives to plastic. The once wonder product is now toxic. *Janet Graham*
