From the Manse

When the question is: "How are you doing?" and probably the answer is "Busy!" but with full of weariness and regret, then there's another question following: "Who's running the world?" Because when we say, with weariness and regret, that we're busy, then the implication is that the world is ours to run, and it's a job too big for us.

We are in Lenten season, and These seasons of Lent equip us to deal with the question "Who's running the world?"

Lent and Easter make it clear that such a job is too big for us, and we can see what happen when we thought it is our job to run the world as we see the news in a TV and newspapers. Lent and Easter make it clear that the world is, in fact, God's to run. Lent and Easter show us that our misunderstanding is forgiven, and something far better awaits us than an impossible task.

The way that Lent sets us free from this tragic and avoidable mistake is through the practices of this season. The three most important are prayer, fasting, and charity.

These Lenten practices have this in common: each one helps us learn again that we're not running the world; God is. Done in the proper spirit, as Jesus recommends, each practice enables us to let go, to rest, to have something more to say than "Busy! Busy! Busy!" And each of these three practices does so in a different way.

Consider prayer. Prayer concerns our relationship with God; prayer is when we allow God to engage us. Insofar as we are praying and our prayer is true, then we simply cannot believe that the world is ours to run. Prayer takes us away from a misunderstanding of responsibility that can turn us into driven people. The frame for our prayer is always that petition from the Lord's Prayer: "Thy will be done." We are free to rest, to rest in God.

Consider fasting. Fasting concerns our relationship with ourselves, as we are creatures of body as well as soul, flesh as well as spirit. Fasting from food, shopping, television or internet, makes us less dependent on those things. When fasting, we don't claim to run the world, we allow some emptiness in ourselves and invite God to fill that emptiness with divine life. Not so much energy as usual is spent digesting, consuming, analysing. We are free to rest, to rest in God. The third practice is charity. This means giving of what we have to meet the needs of people who otherwise would go without. Charity concerns our relationship with other people and all of creation. It is a practical expression of God's justice. When we give alms, we admit that we are not owners, but trustees: trustees of our possessions, our time, our lives. We're not running the world, because the world is not ours to run. Together with everyone else, we are recipients of mercy. We are free to rest, to rest in God.

When we engage in these practices properly, then they bring rest. Not collapse from exhaustion, not even a lack of activity, but a deep restfulness that spares us from being so driven, distracted, and busy. We are able to find the joy that waits for us in what we do. We get a taste of resurrection in our flesh and bones, our moments and our days.

The forty days of Lent call us to leave behind the spirit of 'Busyness'. We are welcome to rest, then to pray and fast and give, and find these practices to be channels of grace, ways by which we can rejoice that thank God! - we do not run the world and God does.

Sunday Nite Live

Sunday Nite Live is a Circuit event every two months. It is held in different churches in the circuit to enable members experience a different form of worship.

The service starts at 7.30 and usually ends at 9.15. Each event is different but all include prayers singing and some biblical input. There are interviews, drama, discussion, guizzes and often a lot of fun.

It is a bit like a 'magazine' with lots of different items depending on the theme for the service. Approximately 45 minutes into the evening refreshments are served ranging from tea and biscuits to a light buffet.

The next Sunday Nite Live is at Trinity on Sunday 14th April. Do please come along and support this event. As it will be Palm Sunday that will be our theme.

Church Council Summary (20th February 2019)

- **Opening devotions:** Led by Seung-Wook based on 1 Peter 1:22 with a meditation on how we should love one another deeply, from the heart.
- **Pastoral Concerns:** Pearl Ansell died on 25th October 2018 and Val Scott died on 13th February 2019. There is a Pastoral Links meeting on 2nd April and a Pastoral Friends lunch on 27th April (see the What's On page for details).
- Minutes of previous meeting: Approved by the meeting and signed by Seung-Wook.
- Appointments: Jackie Roberts was welcomed as our Circuit Representative, replacing Terry Sissons. Anne Gray was pleased to propose Chris Lowe as a new steward on the Leadership Team. This appointment was approved. Annual appointments - Cathy Sheehan has agreed to act as the Independent Examiner of our Church Accounts once again. Roger Owers was re-appointed as Church Treasurer, but he intends to resign this position at the end of the Church Financial Year (31st August, 2019).
- Vacancies: none, apart from representatives from Church members.

Life & Mission of the Church Reports:

- Worship Planning Meeting: Early Church are settling well into their new venue, numbers are increasing and set up time is getting shorter. There will be 8.30am Communion on Easter Sunday, followed by breakfast at 9.15am and All Age Morning Worship with break outs at 10.15am.
- Messy Church: We are filling the spaces most sessions at Messy Church. Graham Seaton and Tasha Williams will be attending the International Messy Church Conference in May. As always more help is needed, especially with the 'Celebration'.
- Early Church: Graham Seaton sent a positive report of the new structure. It is helping to integrate with the rest of the Trinity Family through shared breakfast after the 8.30am communion.
- Leadership Team, Next Steps Review report: Anne Gray presented a summary of the Next Steps meeting, which had been held on Saturday, 26th January.

This summary had drawn together a total of six proposals, which need to be taken forward by the **whole** church community.

- **Proposal 1 Publicity and Communication:** Tasha Williams and Anne Webber will be part of a small group taking responsibility for improving internal communications & publicity.
- **Proposal 2 Worship:** there are 2 names in mind who have suitable skills to advise on the installation of a new audio/visual system.
- **Proposal 3 Worship:** some people are already considering recommendations for improving the content of the 10:30 service.
- **Proposal 4 Worship:** informing preachers of any changes, will be addressed on receipt of the outcomes of Proposal 3.
- Proposal 5 Outreach & Social Action: forming a small group to champion social action. It was agreed that the Neighbourhood, Mission and Family Committee is not very active. It was decided to re-think and start again. Charles Horsefield and Richard Bates agreed to be part of the group, the priority being to identify its terms and purpose. Roger Owers drew attention to the fact that we have £15,000 per annum allocated to Outreach. No-one is taking specific responsibility for deciding how this is spent. The Leadership Team needs to address this issue.
- **Proposal 6 Social Life at Trinity:** it was suggested that Chris Lowe might be approached to co-ordinate a small group to develop this project.
- It is expected that each of the six groups will report their progress to Church Council.
- Seung-Wook will be on sabbatical leave from 10th June 9th September. There will be a Circuit co-ordinated group to support Trinity in his absence.
- **Property Committee:** Complaints about the heating in the sanctuary have been acknowledged, but it is felt that, currently, new heating systems would be too costly. The committee will amend outside notice board to reflect service changes.

- Finance/Resources: An approved proposal to appeal to the congregation for an extra £1 per week in giving as our General Fund is below expectation. A list of policies was compiled; a copy will be kept in the vestry and in the office. Some are available on the website. Regarding the legacies a paper has been drawn up of what the objectives should be when installing a new Audio/ Visual system at Trinity. Two architects have also been consulted to consider the structural development of Trinity.
- Circuit matters: Jackie Roberts was welcomed to the meeting. It was felt Trinity needed to be better informed of youth work across the Circuit.
- **AOB:** Luton Peace Walk on Saturday 21st September.
- Next Church Council: Thursday 27th June, 7.30pm & Tuesday 15th October, 7.30pm
- Annual Church Meeting: Sunday 12th May, 11.30am.

World day of Prayer

The World Day of Prayer Service was held again this year at Trinity. The service was led by Elizabeth Hitchcock and Catherine Roots with support from members of our own church and others in the town.

Our service was focused this year on Slovenia with the theme for the service being 'Come – everything is ready'.

The service was written by Christian women in Slovenia knowing that throughout the world on 1st March there would be people using the prayers and thinking about them and their country. We

heard the stories of various women and how through faith and prayer they had coped with family issues. We sang hymns and a song from their tradition. We celebrated the wonderful gifts of their country and reflected on a picture painted by a Slovenian artist especially for the service booklet.



Six churches were represented at the service to which 46 people attended. The service was appreciated by all and tea and cake were enjoyed after the service.

Next year the country we will be focusing on is Zimbabwe.

When this happens the Lord is our shepherd. To support people in this situation we may have to go without.

What is Toilet Twinning??

Come and help us support this work by attending our Soup & a Roll lunch on Saturday April 6^{th} from 12 – 2pm

With support from Toilet Twinning Brethren in Christ Church (BICC) is running water and sanitation programmes in some of the poorest villages in Choma district, Zambia.

BICC challenges communities to think differently about sanitation. They invite villagers to a meeting where everyone is encouraged to draw a map that shows where people are going to toilet in the open; then they visit some of the places nearby. While the villagers aren't looking, a BICC worker scoops up some of the poo and brings it back to the meeting place, where lunch has been prepared. The poo is placed next to the food! BICC staff then encourage the community to eat – and wait for their disgusted reactions. This interactive experience encourages villagers to think about the link between poor sanitation and ill health, and ultimately to draw up an action plan for building toilets. Every three months, a BICC worker returns to the village to see how they're getting on, until every household has a toilet.

Ginwell one of the BICC workers says, 'In one of the communities, a village leader came to me, beaming. He said, "The toilets have changed everything." He couldn't believe the transformation that had taken place in his village.' (*taken from the toilet twinning literature*)

Trinity Toddlers (by Karen Purton)

Trinity Toddlers works as an outreach on behalf of the Church and welcomes children from birth to four as well as their families and carers. The playgroup runs twice weekly on a Tuesday and Friday morning and is very well attended. It is a great opportunity for us to engage with our local community and for parents, carers and children to socialise and play, making new friendships and connecting with others.

The toddlers group is set up to provide lots of various activities suitable for young babies to Toddlers and beyond until they are of pre-school age, when the children move onto other settings. There is a designated baby area, a kitchen area where the children like to engage in role-play and take care of 'their babies' (the dolls and teddies which are very well loved!)'. A creative station provides the opportunity to make or create something often based around a topic (at the moment we are doing Spring/Easter) as well as a playdough table with various cutters and patterned rolling pins and ever changing playdough colours! 'The train track and trains are very popular as is the 'dog basket', where you can sit quietly with your grown-up and enjoy a story or cuddle up with the teddies. There is a climbing frame and building blocks which help develop large motor skills, and puzzles, shape sorters, games, cars, the castle and farm with accompanying people which helps to promote fine motor skills.

Snack time is a very popular part of the morning where the children sit down alongside one another and enjoy a healthy snack and drink and the grown-ups are provided with a hot drink and biscuits.

Just before we go home we all tidy -up to create a space to all join together in songs and rhymes, before the end of the session.

Quite a few families that attend Toddlers also engage in Messy Church and some families also attend Early Church too. We constantly have new comers as well as regular attendees. It is so good to be involved and sharing in the lives of so many people in our community of Leighton Buzzard.

Fairtrade Coffee Morning (by Sue Horsefield)

Thank you very much to everyone who supported us on 9th March. We were very pleased to see so many people there, including some who are not attenders at Trinity. The Fairtrade cakes and biscuits were very popular, so a special thanks to those who contributed by baking or bringing things along. We raised £140 altogether and half of this will go to the national Fairtrade organisation and half to the local group.

We held the coffee morning in Fairtrade Fortnight to bring attention to the work of farmers around the world who grow produce and sell this under the Fairtrade scheme. This year the focus was especially on cocoa production in West Africa and how this can be affected by changes in climate and pests and diseases. It is a hard life for cocoa farmers but through working together in cooperatives and selling with the Fairtrade scheme, they can negotiate better prices and a more stable income.

If the cocoa and chocolate you buy has the Fairtrade Mark, you can be sure the farmer has received a fair price and has therefore been able to provide a better future for his family. He will also have a greater opportunity to invest in his farm and community through the Fairtrade Premium. Although Fairtrade chocolate and other products may cost a little more, we can be sure that

the farmers are fairly rewarded for their efforts.

Thank you again for your support and if you would like to know more about Fairtrade please ask me. I will continue to have a monthly Fairtrade stall, where a variety of products are available to buy.

Could you pledge an extra £1 a week to Trinity?

If 100 people pledged to give an extra ± 1 per week we would have an extra ± 430 per month.

We currently require $\pm 5,500$ a month in offertories and regular giving to run our church. In the six months since September we have averaged just below $\pm 5,400$ per month. If we can increase that monthly giving figure it would help us place our finances in a more secure position this year and for the future.

As I look ahead to our next financial year which begins next September, I know that if we are to sustain our current outreach work we will either have to apply for significant funding from grants or raise more money ourselves. If we are not able to do this then we shall have to reduce outreach expenditure. We will look for grants to sustain this work, but we may need to fund some of the church administrator work from church funds. An increase in our monthly income will help with the budget for next year.

I am always ready to talk to you about church finances and how you can help the church through regular giving.

If you are able to make a pledge of extra giving please let me know. Your names will never be published but it would be good to know how many people have increased their financial support for the work of our church.

The Leaders of Worship and Preachers Trust (LWPT) is an ecumenical charity which seeks to provide resources, support and information to preachers. LWPT provides resources, training and grants for preachers and leaders of worship of all ages and Christian denominations.

The Leaders of Worship and Preachers Trust began its life in 1849 as a charity which provided financial and other assistance to Methodist and Wesleyan Reform Local Preachers and their families. The Methodist Local Preachers Mutual Aid Association or LPMA as it became known, was a lifeline for many and was supported faithfully and generously by its members through the years.

As welfare provision through the state became increasingly comprehensive there was less call on charities to provide for those in financial need which led to a fundamental review of the way forward for LPMA. The outcome, in 2005, was the formation of LWPT- a new charity with a wider vision to provide support for all preachers and leaders of worship, aiming to provide not only financial support but also preaching resources, events and information.
