Christmas is over and a new year has begun. Once we have got over all the festivities it's back to normal life, whatever that is.

One of the most quoted stories in the bible is that of the lost son in Luke 15:11-32. A man has two sons: One stays at home and works on the farm while the other claims his inheritance early, spends it on good living and prostitutes and returns home when he has run out of money. Despite this his father is pleased to see him which upsets the brother who stayed at home.

These sort of dynamics are not unusual at this time of year. We all get fed up of our relatives from time to time and there is a balance to be struck between the routine and ordinary and the exciting and different. Most of us need a little of both, but there are always practicalities to consider. In this story my sympathies are with the animal that sacrificed its life to feed this dysfunctional family. We should be mindful of those caught in the cross fire of our disputes and keep a sense of perspective.

We can get fed up of people who are constantly around us or with those who don't seem to be there when we need them. Sometimes we forget the needs of the those who do the day to day things that keep us alive and happy. At other times, like the man walking on the opposite side of the road in the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) we may not act on the needs of those we don't know or don't see very often.

It can be difficult to address both needs at the same time. We may not have the ability, resource, insight or connections. We may have other concerns and we all need a break from time to time. Our needs, abilities, understanding and priorities change over time and in different circumstances.

This is why we need God, and a little help from our friends.

Climate Concern and the Threat of Global Warming by Janet Graham

There was a meeting organised by the Christian Ecology Group, Friends of the Earth and the Leighton-Linslade Low Carbon Town at All Saint's Church in November. It was well attended. The speakers were Chris Brierley, a scientist from University College London; Paul Brown, a retired journalist and Steve Dixon from Central Bedfordshire Council.

They addressed the causes of climate change, and what action was needed by councils, governments and individuals to reduce greenhouse gases. We were encouraged to use natural energy like solar panels, wind and waves, free from fossil fuels. Most were against nuclear power and all were against fracking leaving coal in the ground.

Advice given was the following:

- Cut down on meat and dairy products as they use lots of water and cause waste and methane gas, which is more dangerous than carbon dioxide.
- Do not buy more than you need and use it up.
- Avoid plastic packaging and reuse and recycle where possible.
- · Plant more trees.

The councillor did not really answer our questions about facilities but said that a climate emergency three point plan will be launched in April 2020.

As Christians we are stewards of the earth and have a responsibility to look after it.

An Open Letter to the Prime Minister (taken from www.methodist.org.uk)

The President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference have written to the new Prime Minister, assuring him of their prayers and asking for clarification on key issues including climate change, poverty and social cohesion.

We wish to congratulate you on being given the responsibility by the British electorate to form a government, and assure you of our prayers and the prayers of the Methodist people as you take on that responsibility. Churches are rooted in communities around Britain. It is our task to emphasize, from our ground level experience of British society, issues which we believe must be seen as key priorities.

Creation does not belong to us. Our task is to nurture and recognise our place within it. Many of our members see climate change and environmental degradation as the most pressing issues of our day. Can you tell us what steps you will be taking internationally and domestically to help the UK to reach its climate change targets? What kind of lead will you be taking at the 2020 UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow?

Many of our churches and church members are involved in running foodbanks and offering support for people caught up in poverty. Foodbanks should not have to exist. Can you clarify for us what steps your new government will take to address the scandalous levels of poverty, and particularly child poverty?

The church is an inter-generational, multi-ethnic, socially diverse collection of communities. It is far from perfect. But we have seen in our communities growing forms of hostility, divisiveness and hatred, and have sought to support people who have experienced such discord. What active steps will your government now take to work towards healing and greater concord in society?

We wrote to you, Prime Minister, in July to express our concern that a No Deal Brexit was likely to impact the poorest communities very hard indeed. We wish to reaffirm our concern that the poorest in society face huge risks as our trading relations with EU are rewritten. We seek your reassurance that needs of families facing poverty will be central to the proposed trade deal and that should it not be in place before the transition period expires that comprehensive measures are put in place to protect them from the ensuing upheaval.

The Report of the Marriage and Relationships Task Group 2019: God in Love Unites Us

We will be holding a Circuit Open meeting on Sunday January 12th at The Square from 3pm - 5pm to explore the report using the study guide that the church has produced to help us. This is an opportunity for you and others from your church to come and find out more about what is being proposed and how it may affect your church if the recommendations are eventually passed by the Methodist Conference.

Copies of the report and study guide are available in each church - please speak to a steward if you would like to read the report - it can also be found in full on the Methodist Church website. Also, if you require additional hard copies of the report or study guide, please contact Marina Mele at the Circuit Office.

A vote will be taken on this at District Synod, it is therefore important that all Synod representatives have given the report due consideration to enable them to make an informed vote.

Synod votes will in turn be one of the influences informing the decision of the 2020 Methodist Conference.

Our Circuit is set in a particularly diverse area and it is likely that when we all come to such a conversation and exploration there will be a rich variety of thoughts and views about marriage and relationships. We hope that we can explore together - with an attitude of mutual respect for the passionate convictions of others. The task group has sought to find ways and words that can unite us - while continuing to respect the contradictory convictions that people hold.

Any conversation of this nature that touches on matters close to people's hearts will require us to be sensitive and courteous, but I hope we will still be able to share our concerns and our joys with one another with a measure of honesty.

We are all human beings - and we can never be entirely certain that our interpretation of what God says to us - through the Bible or in any other way - is exactly what God is saying. None of us has the monopoly on the truth.

We are simply asked to consider what the report is saying from our perspective, with our experience of life and church - to go a little way on the journey that the Methodist church has been on since 1993 - a Pilgrimage of Faith. We will also pray for all those who are tasked with voting at Synod and Conference.

Please do come and share in the conversation.

Covenant Prayer

At various services during January we will be recommitting our lives to God using the Methodist Covenant Prayer. Take some time over the next few weeks to think about how that looks for you.

I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you. or laid aside for you, exalted for you, or brought low for you; let me be full. let me be empty, let me have all things. let me have nothing: I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal. And now, glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. So be it. And the covenant now made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven.'

The traditional Covenant prayer (shown above) makes it very clear that this affirmation is a serious one that embraces the whole of our life, in all its parts. Most people find it quite tough to say, and really mean it. But the prayer is so central to the Christian life that other Churches have also adopted it. 7
